What is happening now

Floodwater is receding along the River Murray, with water levels dropping rapidly.

It's important for you to continue to monitor the situation, stay updated with South Australian State Emergency Service (SASES) warnings, and—if you own or operate a houseboat—regularly check your houseboat moorings and inspect tether lines to reduce the risk of becoming grounded or serious movement.

Final SASES River Murray Flood Community Newsletter, turning attention to recovery

With the water level dropping, the SASES are working closely with other state government agencies to turn the attention to recovery. The community level recovery program will be managed by the **Community Recovery Coordinator Alex Zimmerman** and the **Department of the Premier and Cabinet (DPC)**. The first of many meetings of the River Murray Community Recovery Committee took place on Monday 30 January 2023. DPC is also coordinating state-level recovery activities and initiatives.

Due to this transition to recovery, this will be the final Community Newsletter created by the SASES for the River Murray flood. Keep an eye out for a Recovery Community Newsletter, which will be produced and provided to the community by the Recovery Incident Management Team in the near future, as well as other regular updates via a variety of channels.

While you may not see as many SASES vehicles or personnel on the ground in the area as you would have seen over the last few months, the SASES will always be available if you need us. You can call 132 500 if you require emergency flood or storm assistance.

Emergency Management Declaration revoked, restrictions still in place and risks still present in river

At 12:00pm on Thursday 9 February 2023, the Emergency Management Declaration (River Murray High Flow and Flood event) was revoked. A Direction is still in place for the

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River Murray. It will continue to be reviewed and restrictions will be lifted as conditions change along the river.

There are still risks present in the river. The SASES reminds the public:

- parts of the river are still in flood, so continue to monitor warnings on the SASES website (www.ses.sa.gov.au) and social media
- be aware of debris in the water when undertaking activities on or in the river, such as logs, trees, household items and damaged infrastructure which may be difficult to see
- obey road closure signs do not drive, ride or walk around them
- do not let children play in or near floodwater or drains
- do not walk, ride or drive through floodwater
- beware of unstable and undercut riverbanks and trees as the water recedes
- if you own a houseboat, regularly check its moorings and inspect tether lines to reduce the risk of becoming grounded or serious movement.

Where the floodwater has dropped, it may still be unsafe in areas that were previously flooded. The soil has been wet for many weeks and the ground may not be secure, and it may take a while for the soil and ground to dry up. Trees may have also become loose, so there may be an increased risk of them falling in windy weather.

If a tree has fallen on your property and is causing a safety risk, or you require emergency flood assistance, contact us on 132 500.

Levee safety

The current Direction states that a person must not enter or remain on an **engaged levee** except as provided for an emergency response or inspection, maintenance, and repair (including inspection, maintenance and repair of the levee, power lines or other infrastructure). You also cannot moor, anchor, attach, or secure any vessel to an engaged levee.

Engaged levee means levees that are still in contact with water.

Although this means that it is no longer restricted for people to enter or remain on a disengaged levee (where the levee is no longer in contact with water), there are still risks and you should take care when around them.

If you see any defects or have any concerns regarding the safety or integrity of an engaged levee, contact the SASES on **132 500**.

Houseboat owners and operators

As conditions continue to change, houseboat owners are being encouraged to:

- inspect tether lines to reduce the risk of becoming grounded or serious movement
- wear a lifejacket while making inspections.
